This Week in Church School

Today's lesson: St. Paul's Second Letter to the Corinthians

Verse (younger classes): II Corinthians 4:6- "For it is God Who commanded light to shine out of darkness, Who has shone in our hearts."

Questions to ask/review:

- Why do we dislike darkness?
- Why is Jesus called the light of the world?
- How can we share His light?

Verse (older classes): II Corinthians 9:7- "So let each one give as he purposes in his heart, not grudgingly or of necessity; for God loves a cheerful giver."

Questions to ask/review:

- Have you ever promised to give to something and then never followed through?
- How much of our lives do we owe to God?
- How much does God ask us to give back to Him?
- Do we have to be rich to give?
- With what attitude does God want us to approach giving grudgingly or willingly? Is that how we usually feel when we give?

Suggested Activities at home:

- Use the child's candle made in class, or another candle, every evening at your prayers.
 Remind them that Jesus is the light of the world.
- Look at physical sources of light: the sun, moon, stars, lamps, candles, etc.
- Sing "This Little Light of Mine".
- Set money aside for God or earn money at home and give a portion back to God.

Prayer: Let my light shine in the world with your holy light.

Tone 2 Troparion (Resurrection)

When <u>Thou</u> didst descend to death, O Life im<u>mor</u>tal,

Thou didst slay hell with the splendor of Thy <u>God</u>head.

And when from the depths Thou didst raise the dead,

all the powers of heaven cried out://
"O Giver of life, Christ our God, glory to Thee!"

Tone 4 Troparion (St Nicholas)

You appeared to your flock as a <u>rule</u> of faith, an image of humility, and a teacher of abstinence.

Because of your lowliness heaven was <u>op</u>ened to you!

Because of your poverty riches were <u>grant</u>ed to you!

O holy Bishop <u>Nich</u>olas, pray to Christ our God to <u>save</u> our souls.

Tone 8 Troparion (Ven. Euthymius)

The image of <u>God</u> was <u>tru</u>ly preserved in thee, O <u>Fath</u>er,

for thou didst take \underline{up} the \underline{Cross} and $\underline{fol}low$ Christ.

By so <u>doing</u>, thou <u>taught</u>est us to disregard the flesh for it <u>pass</u>es away;

but to care in<u>stead</u> for the <u>soul</u>, for it is im<u>mor</u>tal.//

Therefore thy <u>spir</u>it, <u>ven</u>erable Euthymius, rejoices with the <u>ang</u>els.

Tone 2 Kontakion (Resurrection)

<u>Hell</u> became afraid, O almighty <u>Sav</u>ior, seeing the miracle of Thy Resur<u>rec</u>tion from the tomb!

The <u>dead</u> arose! Creation, with Adam, beheld this and re<u>joiced</u> with Thee,// and the world, my Savior, praises <u>Thee</u> for<u>ev</u>er. Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit.

Tone 2 Kontakion (Ven. Euthymius)

<u>Crossing</u> dry-shod through the <u>storms</u> of life, venerable and divinely wise Eu<u>thy</u>mius, thou didst <u>might</u>ily drown the bodiless foe in the <u>streams</u> of thy tears;

thou didst receive the gift of miracles to heal all sufferings.//

Unceasingly pray for us all!

Now and ever and unto ages of ages. Amen.

Tone 6 Kontakion of the Theotokos

Steadfast protectress of <u>Christ</u>ians, constant <u>ad</u>vocate before the Cre<u>a</u>tor, do not despise the cry of us <u>sin</u>ners, but in your <u>good</u>ness come speedily to help us who call on <u>you</u> in faith.

Hasten to hear our intercessions and to intercede for us, O Theo<u>to</u>kos
For you <u>al</u>ways protect those who <u>hon</u>or you.

Tone 2 Prokeimenon (Resurrection)

The Lord is my strength and my song; / He has become my salvation. (Ps. 117:14)

Epistle of the Sunday (2 Corinthians 11:31-12:9)

The God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who is blessed forever, knows that I am not lying. In Damascus the governor, under Aretas the king, was guarding the city of the Damascenes with a garrison, desiring to arrest me; but I was let down in a basket through a window in the wall, and escaped from his hands.

It is doubtless not profitable for me to boast. I will come to visions and revelations of the Lord: I know a man in Christ who fourteen years ago—whether in the body I do not know, or whether out of the body I do not know, God knows—such

a one was caught up to the third heaven. And I know such a man—whether in the body or out of the body I do not know, God knows— how he was caught up into Paradise and heard inexpressible words, which it is not lawful for a man to utter. Of such a one I will boast; yet of myself I will not boast, except in my infirmities. For though I might desire to boast, I will not be a fool; for I will speak the truth. But I refrain, lest anyone should think of me above what he sees me to be or hears from me.

And lest I should be exalted above measure by the abundance of the revelations, a thorn in the flesh was given to me, a messenger of Satan to buffet me, lest I be exalted above measure. Concerning this thing I pleaded with the Lord three times that it might depart from me. And He said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for My strength is made perfect in weakness." Therefore most gladly I will rather boast in my infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me.

Gospel of the Sunday (Luke 8:5-15)

"A sower went out to sow his seed. And as he sowed, some fell by the wayside; and it was trampled down, and the birds of the air devoured it. Some fell on rock; and as soon as it sprang up, it withered away because it lacked moisture. And some fell among thorns, and the thorns sprang up with it and choked it. But others fell on good ground, sprang up, and yielded a crop a hundredfold." When He had said these things He cried, "He who has ears to hear, let him hear!"

Then His disciples asked Him, saying, "What does this parable mean?"

And He said, "To you it has been given to know the mysteries of the kingdom of God, but to the rest it is given in parables, that

'Seeing they may not see, And hearing they may not understand.' "Now the parable is this: The seed is the word of God. Those by the wayside are the ones who hear; then the devil comes and takes away the word out of their hearts, lest they should believe and be saved. But the ones on the rock are those who, when they hear, receive the word with joy; and these have no root, who believe for a while and in time of temptation fall away. Now the ones that fell among thorns are those who, when they have heard, go out and are choked with cares, riches, and pleasures of life, and bring no fruit to maturity. But the ones that fell on the good ground are those who, having heard the word with a noble and good heart, keep it and bear fruit with patience.

Communion Hymn

Praise the Lord from the heavens, praise Him in the highest! (Ps. 148:1) Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia!

Be careful not to receive the word on a stony ground, which would produce the fruit of good works, but without the roots of perseverance. Because many love what they hear, and propose to undertake good works, but soon, fatigue due to difficulties makes them abandon what was started. The stony ground thus lacked moisture, since it could not bring what had sprouted to the fruit that perseverance produces. Many, indeed, when they hear talk against avarice, hate this greed and praise the scorn of all things. But as soon as their soul sees a desirable object, it forgets what it praised. Many, when they hear talk against lust, not only do not want to defile their flesh, but blush to have it defiled. However, as soon as a beauty of flesh appears in their eyes, their soul is carried away by desire as if they had not yet taken any resolution to resist such a desire. And they commit reprehensible acts, though they have previously condemned in their hearts those they remembered to have committed. (St Gregory Dia)


