This Week in Church School

Today's lesson: Confession and Ordination Questions to ask/review:

- Why do we sin? How are we like the Prodigal Son in the parable?
- How can we prayerfully prepare for confession? What questions can we ask ourselves?
- How was confession performed in the early Church? Why did this change?
- Why can't we just confess in secret to God?
- Who does the priest represent? Who forgives your sins?
- Ordination
- What was the role of the original deacons? How has this changed?
- In the early Church, how were new churches begun?
- How many churches were there in a city at first?
- Who was the head of a city's church? How did the need for more than one priest in a city develop?
- Who is the head of the bishop? (Christ Himself)
- What is the primary job of the bishop? (to perpetuate the church)?
- Who can ordain and through whose authority? Why can't just anyone ordain a man if everyone can see he has a "gift"?
- What is the name of our bishop? Does one bishop have all authority over all other bishops in the world? (no)
- What gifts or talents would make one a good priest?
- Do any of you feel "called" to the priesthood?
- At what part of the service can bishops, priests, or deacons be ordained?
- What happens at an ordination? Who must perform it? Why?

Suggested Activities at home:

• Make a "muddy picture". Have each child color a picture of his own face on a paper plate. Cover the plate with plastic wrap. Remind them that we are all to shine with the love of Jesus so everyone can see Jesus in us, just like the shiny face. Then have the children smear the face with "mud", covering their face and making it unrecognizable. Can anyone see Jesus in us now? This is how we are when we are covered with sin. Now wipe off the mud. We are clean again! Discuss how this is like our need for confession.

Prayer: Father, forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us. Amen. *OR* Lord grant many years and wisdom to our bishops, priests, and deacons.

Epistle of the Sunday (Hebrews 9:11-14)

But Christ came as High Priest of the good things to come, with the greater and more perfect tabernacle not made with hands, that is, not of this creation. Not with the blood of goats and calves, but with His own blood He entered the Most Holy Place once for all, having obtained eternal redemption. For if the blood of bulls and goats and the ashes of a heifer, sprinkling the unclean, sanctifies for the purifying of the flesh, how much more shall the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered Himself without spot to God, cleanse your conscience from dead works to serve the living God?

Gospel of the Sunday (Mark 10:32-45)

Now they were on the road, going up to Jerusalem, and Jesus was going before them; and they were amazed. And as they followed they were afraid. Then He took the twelve aside again and began to tell them the things that would happen to Him: "Behold, we are going up to Jerusalem, and the Son of Man will be betrayed to the chief priests and to the scribes; and they will condemn Him to death and deliver Him to the Gentiles; and they will mock Him, and scourge Him, and spit on Him, and kill Him. And the third day He will rise again."

Then James and John, the sons of Zebedee, came to Him, saying, "Teacher, we want You to do for us whatever we ask."

And He said to them, "What do you want Me to do for you?"

They said to Him, "Grant us that we may sit, one on Your right hand and the other on Your left, in Your glory."

But Jesus said to them, "You do not know what you ask. Are you able to drink the cup that I drink, and be baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with?"

They said to Him, "We are able."

So Jesus said to them, "You will indeed drink the cup that I drink, and with the baptism I am baptized with you will be baptized; but to sit on My right hand and on My left is not Mine to give, but it is for those for whom it is prepared."

And when the ten heard it, they began to be greatly displeased with James and John. But Jesus called them to Himself and said to them, "You know that those who are considered rulers over the Gentiles lord it over them, and their great ones exercise authority over them. Yet it shall not be so among you; but whoever desires to become great among you shall be your servant. And whoever of you desires to be first shall be slave of all. For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life a ransom for many."

Communion Hymn

Praise the Lord from the heavens, praise Him in the highest! (Ps. 148:1) The righteous shall be in everlasting remembrance! He shall not fear evil tidings! (Ps. 111:6) Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia!

St Mary began her life as a young woman who followed the passions of the body, running away from her parents at age twelve for Alexandria. There she lived as a harlot for seventeen years, refusing money from the men that she copulated with, instead living by begging and spinning flax.

One day, however, she met a group of young men heading toward the sea to sail to Jerusalem for the veneration of the Holy Cross. Mary went along for the ride, seducing the men as they traveled for the fun of it. But when the group reached Jerusalem and actually went towards the church, Mary was prohibited from entering by an unseen force. After three such attempts, she remained outside on the church patio, where she looked up and saw an icon of the Theotokos. She began to weep and prayed with all her might that the Theotokos might allow her to see the True Cross; afterwards, she promised, she would renounce her worldly desires and go wherever the Theotokos may lead her.

After this heart-felt conversion at the doors of the church, she fled into the desert to live as an ascetic. She survived for years on only three loaves of bread and thereafter on scarce herbs of the land. For another seventeen years, Mary was tormented by "wild beasts mad desires and passions." After these years of temptation, however, she overcame the passions and was led by the Theotokos in all things Following 47 years in solitude, she met the priest St. Zosima in the desert, who pleaded with her to tell him of her life. She recounted her story with great humility while also demonstrating her gift of clairvoyance.
