This Week in Church School

Today's lesson: Sacrament of Holy Unction

Questions to ask/review:

- Can Jesus really heal the sick? Did Jesus have to touch the person to heal him? (no)
- Are there miracles and healings today? (yes)
- How does the sacrament of Holy Unction differ from other forms of healing that may be promoted in today's culture?
- Don't we have doctors now we can go to if we are sick?
- Why doesn't Jesus heal everyone? Why do we get sick at all?
- Should we only call for Holy Unction when we are dying? (no)
- In what other ways can we as Christians serve those who are ill, especially those who are chronically ill?
- What happens at the sacrament of Holy Unction? Where in the Scriptures is this sacrament discussed?
- Why do some churches serve Holy Unction during Holy Week?

Suggested Activities at home:

- Make a list or refer to the parish prayer list and include the sick in your personal or family prayers.
- Send a card or phone call to someone who is sick.

Prayer: Lord help those who are sick and suffering according to Your will. Amen.

Hymns and Readings for Sunday, April 28

First Antiphon (Psalm 115)

v. I love the Lord because He has heard the voice of my supplication.

Refrain: Through the prayers of the Theotokos, O Savior, save us.

- v. Because He inclined His ear to me; therefore I will call on Him as long as I live.
- v. The snares of death encompassed me; the pangs of hell laid hold on me.

Troparion of the Feast Tone 1

By <u>raising</u> Lazarus from the dead before Thy <u>pas</u>sion,

Thou didst confirm the universal resurrection, O Christ God.

Like the <u>child</u>ren with the palms of <u>vic</u>tory, we cry out to Thee, O <u>Van</u>quisher of Death: "Hosanna in the highest!

Blessed is He that comes in the <u>name</u> of the Lord!"

Another Troparion of the Feast Tone 4

When we were buried with Thee in baptism, O Christ God,

we were made worthy of eternal life by Thy Resur<u>rec</u>tion.

Now we praise Thee and sing:

"Hosanna in the highest!

Blessed is He that comes in the <u>name</u> of the Lord!"

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit, now and ever and unto ages of ages. Amen.

Kontakion of the Feast Tone 6

Sitting on Thy throne in <u>Heav</u>en, carried on a foal on earth, O <u>Christ</u> God, Accept the praise of angels and the songs of <u>child</u>ren, who sing:

"Blessed is He Who comes to recall Adam!"

Prokeimenon of the Feast Tone 4 (Ps 118)

Blessed is He that comes in the name of the Lord! God is the Lord and has revealed Himself to us!

Epistle of the Feast (Phil 4:4-9)

Rejoice in the Lord always. Again I will say, rejoice! Let your gentleness be known to all men. The Lord is at hand. Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and

supplication, with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God; and the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus.

Gospel of the Feast (Jn 12:1-18)

Then, six days before the Passover, Jesus came to Bethany, where Lazarus was who had been dead, whom He had raised from the dead. There they made Him a supper; and Martha served, but Lazarus was one of those who sat at the table with Him. Then Mary took a pound of very costly oil of spikenard, anointed the feet of Jesus, and wiped His feet with her hair. And the house was filled with the fragrance of the oil.

But one of His disciples, Judas Iscariot, Simon's son, who would betray Him, said, "Why was this fragrant oil not sold for three hundred denarii and given to the poor?" This he said, not that he cared for the poor, but because he was a thief, and had the money box; and he used to take what was put in it.

But Jesus said, "Let her alone; she has kept this for the day of My burial. For the poor you have with you always, but Me you do not have always."

Now a great many of the Jews knew that He was there; and they came, not for Jesus' sake only, but that they might also see Lazarus, whom He had raised from the dead. But the chief priests plotted to put Lazarus to death also, because on account of him many of the Jews went away and believed in Jesus.

The next day a great multitude that had come to the feast, when they heard that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem, took branches of palm trees and went out to meet Him, and cried out: "Hosanna! Blessed is He who comes in the name of the LORD! The King of Israel!"

Then Jesus, when He had found a young donkey, sat on it; as it is written: "Fear not, daughter of Zion; Behold, your King is coming, sitting on a donkey's colt."

His disciples did not understand these things at first; but when Jesus was glorified, then they remembered that these things were written about Him and that they had done these things to Him.

Therefore the people, who were with Him when He called Lazarus out of his tomb and raised him from the dead, bore witness. For this reason the people also met Him, because they heard that He had done this sign.

Hymn to the Theotokos of the Feast

God is the Lord and has revealed Himself to us! Celebrate the feast and come with gladness! Let us magnify Christ with palms and branches singing: "Blessed is He that comes in the name of the Lord!"

Communion Hymn (Ps 148)

Praise Him in Blessed is He that comes in the name of the Lord! God is the Lord and has revealed Himself to us!

By holding palms (in Hebrew, the tender branch is called *vaion*, a palm branch), they were signifying Christ's imminent victory over death. For it was the custom to honor the victors of contests or battles with triumphal processions and to lead them around with branches from evergreens. The meaning of Hosanna is "Save now, we pray" or "Therefore, save." The colt prefigured the Gentiles. The ass's colt was still an untamed animal and impure according to the Jewish law. Christ's sitting and resting on the "Gentiles" showed our taming and obedience to the "law" of the Holy Gospel and Christ as Champion, Victor, and King of all the earth.

Today we not only welcome the Lord riding on a colt into the city of Jerusalem, but Christ who comes in power and glory as King of the age to come.
