Church School This Week

Today's Lesson: Dormition of the Mother of God and St. Nicholas

Questions to ask/review:

- Who did Christ entrust with the care of His mother?
 - Where were the disciples when the Theotokos died?
 - How were they able to be present at her burial?
 - Who was not present?
 - What did Thomas find when trying to see the Theotokos once more?
 - Why does his discovery gives us hope?
 - Why are flowers used to remember this event?
 - Where was St. Nicholas from?
 - What was his role in the Church?
 - Why is St. Nicholas known as a "Wonderworker"?
 - Give an example of an act of generosity done by St. Nicholas.
 - Compare Santa Claus to the real St. Nicholas.
- Suggested Activities at home:**
- Use flowers to beautify your house and discuss how flowers are used to remember the Dormition.
 - Sing St. Nicholas songs together, or perform the songs from the Yolka for visiting family members.
 - Do a charitable act as a family, or ask your child to consider how they can be generous like St. Nicholas.

Hymns and Readings for Sunday, December 4

Tone 8 Troparion (Resurrection)

Thou didst descend from on high, O Merciful One!
Thou didst accept the three day burial to free us from our sufferings!//
O Lord, our Life and Resurrection, glory to Thee!

Tone 4 Troparion (St Nicholas)

You appeared to your flock as a rule of faith, an image of humility, and a teacher of abstinence.
Because of your lowliness heaven was opened to you!
Because of your poverty riches were granted to you!
O holy Bishop Nicholas,
pray to Christ our God to save our souls.

Tone 8 Troparion (St. Barbara)

Let us honor the holy Martyr Barbara,
for, as a bird, she escaped the snares of the Enemy!//
and destroyed them through the help and defense of the Cross!

Tone 8 Troparion (St. John)

O Champion of Orthodoxy, teacher of purity and of true worship,
the enlightener of the universe and the adornment of hierarchs;
all wise Father John, thy teachings have gleamed with light upon all things.//
Intercede before Christ God to save our souls!

Tone 6 Troparion (St. Alexander)

In a time of fiery temptations for the Church of Russia,
thou didst manifest Christ's love to thy flock through meekness and humility.
As a good pastor thou didst lay down thy life for Him.//

Pray for us, Hieromartyr Alexander, that our souls may be illumined!

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit.

Tone 8 Kontakion (Resurrection)

By rising from the tomb, Thou didst raise the dead and resurrect Adam.
Eve exults in Thy Resurrection!//
and the world celebrates Thy rising from the dead, O greatly Merciful One!

Now and ever and unto ages of ages. Amen.

Tone 6 Kontakion of the Theotokos

Steadfast protectress of Christians,
constant advocate before the Creator,
do not despise the cry of us sinners,
but in your goodness come speedily to help us who call on you in faith.
Hasten to hear our intercessions and to intercede for us, O Theotokos
For you always protect those who honor you.

Tone 8 Prokeimenon (Resurrection)

Pray and make your vows / before the Lord, our God! (Ps. 75:10a)

Epistle of the Sunday (Ephesians 4:1-6)

I, therefore, the prisoner of the Lord, beseech you to walk worthy of the calling with which you were called, with all lowliness and gentleness, with longsuffering, bearing with one another in love, endeavoring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called in one hope of your calling; one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all, who is above all, and through all, and in you all.

Gospel of the Sunday (Luke 17:12-19)

Then as He entered a certain village, there met Him ten men who were lepers, who stood afar off. And they lifted up their voices and said, "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!"

So when He saw them, He said to them, "Go, show yourselves to the priests." And so it was that as they went, they were cleansed.

And one of them, when he saw that he was healed, returned, and with a loud voice glorified God, and fell down on his face at His feet, giving Him thanks. And he was a Samaritan.

So Jesus answered and said, "Were there not ten cleansed? But where are the nine? Were there not any found who returned to give glory to God except this foreigner?" And He said to him, "Arise, go your way. Your faith has made you well."

On Giving Thanks

"He who shall preserve the life bestowed upon him, and give thanks to Him Who imparted it, shall receive also length of days forever and ever. But he who shall reject it, and prove himself ungrateful to his Maker, inasmuch as he has been created, and has not recognized Him Who bestowed the gift upon him, deprives himself of the privilege of continuance forever and ever. And, for this reason, the Lord declared to those who showed themselves ungrateful towards Him: 'If you have not been faithful in that which is little, who will give you that which is great?' (cf. Lk. 16:11) indicating that those who, in this brief temporal life, have shown themselves ungrateful to Him Who bestowed it, shall justly not receive from Him length of days

forever and ever." - St. Irenaeus, The Ante-Nicene Fathers Vol. 1

You should continually and unceasingly call to mind all the blessings which God in His love has bestowed on you in the past, and still bestows for the salvation of your soul. You must not let forgetfulness of evil or laziness make you grow unmindful of these many and great blessings, and so pass the rest of your life uselessly and ungratefully.
