After saying the Trisagion prayers, then say:

Rising from sleep we fall down before thee, O Good One, and with the angels' song we cry to thee, Allpowerful: Holy, Holy, Holy art thou, O God: through the Theotokos, have mercy on us.

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit.

O Lord, who hast raised me from bed and from sleep, enlighten my mind and heart, and open my lips that I may sing of thee, O Holy Trinity: Holy, Holy, Holy art thou, O God: through the Theotokos, have mercy on us.

Now and ever and unto ages of ages. Amen.

The Judge shall come suddenly, and the deeds of each shall be exposed. But at midnight we cry out with fear: Holy, Holy, Holy art thou, O God: through the Theotokos, have mercy on us.

Lord, have mercy. (12x)

Rising from sleep, I thank thee, O Holy Trinity. For, in the abundance of thy goodness and patience, thou hast not been angry with me, idler and sinner though I be, nor hast thou destroyed me together with my iniquities; but thou hast shown thy usual love for mankind, and hast raised me up as I lay helpless, that I might rise early and glorify thy dominion. Enlighten now the eyes of my mind and open my lips that I may study thy words, and come to understand thy commandments, and accomplish thy will, and hymn thee in heartfelt confession, and praise thine all-holy Name, of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, now and ever and unto ages of ages. Amen.

Tone 1 Troparion (*Resurrection*) When the <u>stone</u> had been sealed by the <u>Jews</u>, while the soldiers were guarding Thy most pure <u>bo</u>dy, They didet rise on the third day. O Service

Thou didst <u>rise</u> on the third day, O <u>Sa</u>vior, granting <u>life</u> to the world.

- The <u>pow</u>ers of heaven therefore cried to Thee, O <u>Giv</u>er of Life:
- "Glory to Thy Resur<u>rec</u>tion, O Christ!
- <u>Glo</u>ry to Thy <u>King</u>dom!//

Tone 4 Troparion (St Nicholas)

- Because of your poverty riches were <u>grant</u>ed to you!
- O holy Bishop <u>Nich</u>olas,
- pray to Christ our God to save our souls.

Tone 8 Troparion (St. Tikhon)

- From thy youth <u>thou</u> didst love <u>Christ</u>, O <u>bless</u>ed one.
- Thou hast been an ex<u>ample for all</u> by word, life, love, faith, purity, and hu<u>mil</u>ity.
- Therefore, thou dost now a<u>bide</u> in the <u>heav</u>enly <u>man</u>sions,

where thou standest be<u>fore</u> the <u>throne</u> of the All-holy <u>Trin</u>ity.// Holy Hierarch <u>Tikh</u>on, <u>pray</u> for the sal<u>va</u>tion of our souls!

Tone 8 Kontakion (St. Tikhon)

Successor to the A<u>pos</u>tles, <u>adornment</u> of hierarchs, teacher of the <u>Or</u>thodox Faith,// beseech the Master of <u>all</u> to grant <u>peace</u> to the world and to our souls great <u>mer</u>cy.

Now and ever and unto ages of ages. Amen.

Tone 7 Kontakion (Feast)

- On the <u>moun</u>tain Thou wast transfigured, O <u>Christ</u> God,
- and Thy Disciples beheld Thy glory as far as they could <u>see</u> it;
- so that when <u>they</u> would behold Thee <u>cru</u>cified, they would understand that Thy suffering was <u>vol</u>untary,

and would pro<u>claim</u> to the <u>world</u>//

that Thou art truly the <u>Ra</u>diance of the <u>Fa</u>ther.

Tone 4 Prokeimenon (Feast)

O Lord, how manifold are Thy works; / in wisdom hast Thou made them all. (*Ps. 103:26*)

Epistle of the Sunday (1 Corinthians 4:9-16)

For I think that God has displayed us, the apostles, last, as men condemned to death; for we have been made a spectacle to the world, both to angels and to men. We are fools for Christ's sake, but you are wise in Christ! We are weak, but you are strong! You are distinguished, but we are dishonored! To the present hour we both hunger and thirst, and we are poorly clothed, and beaten, and homeless. And we labor, working with our own hands. Being reviled, we bless; being persecuted, we endure; being defamed, we entreat. We have been made as the filth of the world, the offscouring of all things until now.

I do not write these things to shame you, but as my beloved children I warn you. For though you might have ten thousand instructors in Christ, yet you do not have many fathers; for in Christ Jesus I have begotten you through the gospel. Therefore I urge you, imitate me.

Gospel of the Sunday (Matthew 17:14-23)

And when they had come to the multitude, a man came to Him, kneeling down to Him and saying, "Lord, have mercy on my son, for he is an epileptic and suffers severely; for he often falls into the fire and often into the water. So I brought him to Your disciples, but they could not cure him."

Then Jesus answered and said, "O faithless and perverse generation, how long shall I be with you? How long shall I bear with you? Bring him here to Me." And Jesus rebuked the demon, and it came out of him; and the child was cured from that very hour.

Then the disciples came to Jesus privately and said, "Why could we not cast it out?"

So Jesus said to them, "Because of your unbelief; for assuredly, I say to you, if you have faith as a mustard seed, you will say to this mountain, 'Move from here to there,' and it will move; and nothing will be impossible for you. However, this kind does not go out except by prayer and fasting."

Now while they were staying in Galilee, Jesus said to them, "The Son of Man is about to be betrayed into the hands of men, and they will kill Him, and the third day He will be raised up." And they were exceedingly sorrowful.

Tone 4 Festal Hymn to the Theotokos

Magnify, O my soul, the Lord Who was transfigured on Mount Tabor! Thy childbearing was without corruption; God came forth from thy body clothed in flesh, and appeared on earth and dwelt among men.// Therefore we all magnify thee, O Theotokos.

Communion Hymn

Praise the Lord from the heavens, praise Him in the highest! (*Ps. 148:1*) O Lord, we will walk in the light of Thy countenance, and will exult in Thy Name forever. (*Ps. 88:15*) Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia!

These are the divine wonders we celebrate

today; this is the saving revelation given us upon the mountain; this is the festival of Christ that has drawn us here. Let us listen, then, to the sacred voice of God so compellingly calling us from on high, from the summit of the mountain, so that with the Lord's chosen disciples we may penetrate the deep meaning of these holy mysteries, so far beyond our capacity to express. Jesus goes before us to show us the way, both up the mountain and into heaven, and - I speak boldly - it is for us now to follow him with all speed, yearning for the heavenly vision that will give us a share in his radiance, renew our spiritual nature and transform us into his own likeness, making us for ever sharers in his Godhead and raising us to heights as vet undreamed of.

Let us run with confidence and joy to enter into the cloud like Moses and Elijah, or like James and John. Let us be caught up like Peter to behold the divine vision and to be transfigured by that glorious transfiguration. Let us retire from the world, stand aloof from the earth, rise above the body, detach ourselves from creatures and turn to the creator, to whom Peter in ecstasy exclaimed: Lord, it is good for us to be here.

It is indeed good to be here, as you have said, Peter. It is good to be with Jesus and to remain here for ever. What greater happiness or higher honor could we have than to be with God, to be made like him and to live in his light? st Anastasius Sinai
