This Week in Church School

Today's lesson: St. Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians

Verse (younger classes): "For I am determined not to know anything among you except Jesus Christ and Him crucified." (1 Corinthians 2:2)

Questions to ask/review:

- What challenges were the people of Corinth facing at the time of Paul's letter?
- What is sin? When have we sinned?
- What do our parents do when we sin?
- Did Jesus ever sin?
- What did God do because of our sins?
- Why is Jesus called the "Lamb of God"?
- Why is the cross the symbol of our faith?

Verse (older classes): ""For what have I to do with judging those also who are outside? Do you not judge those who are inside?" (1 Corinthians 5:12)

Questions to ask/review:

- Should we talk to our friends about wrong behavior? Under what circumstances?
- What is the difference between judging right from wrong and judging someone's salvation?

Suggested Activities at home:

- Read and discuss this week's Scripture verses.
- If your child is of confession age, encourage them to consider their sins and plan to attend confession.
- When children make mistakes at home, model God's love and forgiveness to them.
 Prayer: O Lord, we ask that you help us to bear our cross. Teach us and lead us to your truth.
 Amen.

Tone 4 Troparion (Protection)

Today the faithful celebrate the <u>feast</u> with joy, illumined by thy coming, O <u>Moth</u>er of God. Beholding thy pure image, we fervently <u>cry</u> to thee:

"Encompass us beneath the precious veil of thy pro<u>tec</u>tion;

deliver us from every form of <u>evil</u> by entreating Christ, thy <u>Son</u> and our God,// that He may <u>save</u> our souls."

Tone 4 Troparion (St Nicholas)

You appeared to your flock as a <u>rule</u> of faith, an image of humility, and a teacher of

<u>ab</u>stinence.

- Because of your lowliness heaven was <u>op</u>ened to you!
- Because of your poverty riches were <u>grant</u>ed to you!
- O holy Bishop <u>Nich</u>olas,

pray to Christ our God to save our souls.

Tone 4 Troparion (St. Romanus)

Thou didst gladden Christ's Church by thy <u>mel</u>odies

like an inspired heavenly <u>trumpet</u>. Thou wast enlightened by the <u>Mother of God</u> and didst shine on the world as God's <u>poet</u>.// We lovingly honor thee, O righteous Ro<u>man</u>us.

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit.

Tone 8 Kontakion (Resurrection)

By rising <u>from</u> the <u>tomb</u>, Thou didst raise the dead and resurrect <u>Ad</u>am.

Eve exults <u>in</u> Thy <u>Res</u>ur<u>rec</u>tion,// and the world <u>cel</u>ebrates Thy <u>ris</u>ing from the dead, O greatly Merciful One!

Now and ever and unto ages of ages. Amen.

Tone 3 Kontakion (Protection)

- Today the <u>Virg</u>in stands in the <u>midst</u> of the Church,
- and with choirs of saints she invisibly prays to <u>God</u> for us.
- Angels and <u>bish</u>ops <u>wor</u>ship,
- Apostles and Prophets rejoice to<u>geth</u>er,// since for our sake she <u>prays</u> to the <u>pre</u>-e<u>ter</u>nal God.

Tone 8 Prokeimenon (Resurrection)

Pray and make your vows / before the Lord, our God! (*Ps. 75:10a*)

Epistle of the Sunday (2 Corinthians 6:16-7:1)

And what agreement has the temple of God with idols? For you are the temple of the living God. As God has said:

"I will dwell in them And walk among them. I will be their God, And they shall be My people."

Therefore

"Come out from among them And be separate, says the Lord. Do not touch what is unclean, And I will receive you." "I will be a Father to you, And you shall be My sons and daughters, Says the Lord Almighty."

Therefore, having these promises, beloved, let us cleanse ourselves from all filthiness of the flesh and spirit, perfecting holiness in the fear of God.

Gospel of the Sunday (Luke 6:31-36)

And just as you want men to do to you, you also do to them likewise.

"But if you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners love those who love them. And if you do good to those who do good to you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners do the same. And if you lend to those from whom you hope to receive back, what credit is that to you? For even sinners lend to sinners to receive as much back. But love your enemies, do good, and lend, hoping for nothing in return; and your reward will be great, and you will be sons of the Most High. For He is kind to the unthankful and evil. Therefore be merciful, just as your Father also is merciful.

The miraculous appearance of the Mother of God

occurred in the **mid-tenth century** in Constantinople, in the Blachernae church where her robe, veil, and part of her belt were preserved after being transferred from Palestine in the fifth century.

On Sunday, October 1, during the All Night Vigil, when the church was overflowing with those at prayer, the Fool-for-Christ Saint Andrew (October 2), at the fourth hour, lifted up his eyes towards the heavens and beheld our most Holy Lady Theotokos coming through the air, resplendent with heavenly light and surrounded by an assembly of the Saints. Saint John the Baptist and the holy Apostle John the Theologian accompanied the Queen of Heaven. On bended knees the Most Holy Virgin tearfully prayed for Christians for a long time. Then, coming near the Bishop's Throne, she continued her prayer.

After completing her prayer she took her veil and spread it over the people praying in church, protecting them from enemies both visible and invisible. The Most Holy Lady Theotokos was resplendent with heavenly glory, and the protecting veil in her hands gleamed "more than the rays of the sun." Saint Andrew gazed trembling at the miraculous vision and he asked his disciple, the blessed Epiphanius standing beside him, "Do you see, brother, the Holy Theotokos, praying for all the world?" Epiphanius answered, "I do see, holy Father, and I am in awe."

The Ever-Blessed Mother of God implored the Lord Jesus Christ to accept the prayers of all the people calling on His Most Holy Name, and to respond speedily to her intercession, "O Heavenly King, accept all those who pray to You and call on my name for help. Do not let them go away from my icon unheard."

Saints Andrew and Epiphanius were worthy to see the Mother of God at prayer, and "for a long time observed the Protecting Veil spread over the people and shining with flashes of glory. As long as the Most Holy Theotokos was there, the Protecting Veil was also visible, but with her departure it also became invisible. After taking it with her, she left behind the grace of her visitation."
