This Week in Church School

Today's lesson: St. Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians

Verse (younger classes): I Corinthians 9:24- "Do you not know that those who run in a race all run, but one receives the prize? Run in such a way that you may obtain it." OR I Corinthians 13: 5 -"Love... does not seek its own."

Questions to ask/review:

- How is our life similar to a race? What is our "prize"?
- What can help us to win the race? What do we need?
- What does it mean to "not seek your own"?
- What can you do this week to practice not seeking your own?

Verse (older classes): I Corinthians 12:14- "For in fact the body is not one member, but many."

Questions to ask/review:

- In what way can the Church be called the body of Christ?
- How does Jesus work in the world today? (through us)
- Do we all have the same talents?
- What are your talents? What part(s) of the body are you most like?

Suggested Activities at home:

- Read and discuss this week's Scripture verse.
- Run relay race in the backyard with family or friends. Discuss how life is similar to the race.
- Follow through on your child's action plan to share this week.

Prayer: Lord, give me strength and health to run the race of life as did thy saints. OR Lord, let me love my neighbor today, as You love me.

Tone 1 Troparion (Resurrection)

When the <u>stone</u> had been sealed by the <u>Jews</u>, while the soldiers were guarding Thy most pure <u>bo</u>dy,

Thou didst <u>rise</u> on the third day, O <u>Sa</u>vior, granting <u>life</u> to the world.

The <u>pow</u>ers of heaven therefore cried to Thee, O <u>Giv</u>er of Life:

"Glory to Thy Resur<u>rec</u>tion, O Christ!

<u>Glory</u> to Thy <u>Kingdom!//</u>
Glory to Thy dispensation, O Thou Who <u>lov</u>est mankind!"

Tone 4 Troparion (St Nicholas)

You appeared to your flock as a <u>rule</u> of faith, an image of humility, and a teacher of <u>ab</u>stinence.

Because of your lowliness heaven was <u>op</u>ened to you!

Because of your poverty riches were granted to you!

O holy Bishop <u>Nich</u>olas, pray to Christ our God to save our souls.

Tone 8 Troparion (Fathers)

Thou art most <u>glo</u>rious, O <u>Christ</u> our God, Who hast es<u>tab</u>lished the <u>Ho</u>ly Fathers as <u>lights</u> on the earth.

Through them Thou hast <u>guid</u>ed us to the <u>True</u> Faith.//

O greatly compassionate One, glory to Thee!

Tone 1 Kontakion (Resurrection)

As \underline{God} , Thou didst rise from the tomb in \underline{glo} ry, raising the \underline{world} with Thyself.

Human <u>na</u>ture praises Thee as God, for death has <u>van</u>ished.

Adam exults, O Master!

Eve rejoices, for she is freed from bondage and cries to Thee://

"Thou art the Giver of Resurrection to <u>all</u>, O Christ!"

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit.

Tone 6 Kontakion (Fathers)

The Son Who shone forth from the <u>Fa</u>ther was ineffably born, two-fold in nature, of a <u>wom</u>an.

Having beheld Him, we do not deny the <u>image</u> of His form,

but depict it piously and revere it <u>faith</u>fully. Thus, keeping the <u>True</u> Faith,// the Church venerates the icon of Christ Incarnate.

Now and ever and unto ages of ages. Amen.

Tone 6 Kontakion of the Theotokos

Steadfast protectress of <u>Christ</u>ians, constant <u>ad</u>vocate before the Cre<u>a</u>tor, do not despise the cry of us <u>sin</u>ners, but in your <u>good</u>ness come speedily to help us who call on <u>you</u> in faith.

Hasten to hear our intercessions and to intercede for us, O Theotokos

For you <u>al</u>ways protect those who <u>hon</u>or you.

Tone 1 Prokeimenon (Resurrection)

Let Thy mercy, O Lord, be upon us / as we have set our hope on Thee! (*Ps.* 32:22)

Tone 4 Prokeimenon (Fathers)

Blessed art Thou, O Lord God of our fathers, / and praised and glorified is Thy Name forever! (v. 3)

Epistle of the Sunday (2 Corinthians 9:6-11)

But this I say: He who sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and he who sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. So let each one give as he purposes in his heart, not grudgingly or of necessity; for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to make all grace abound toward you, that you, always having all sufficiency in all things, may have an abundance for every good work. As it is written:

"He has dispersed abroad, He has given to the poor; His righteousness endures forever."

Now may He who supplies seed to the sower, and bread for food, supply and multiply the seed you have sown and increase the fruits of your righteousness, while you are enriched in everything for all liberality, which causes thanksgiving through us to God.

Gospel of the Sunday (Luke 7:11-16)

Now it happened, the day after, that He went into a city called Nain; and many of His disciples went with Him, and a large crowd. And when He came near the gate of the city, behold, a dead man was being carried out, the only son of his mother; and she was a widow. And a large crowd from the city was with her. When the Lord saw her, He had compassion on her and said to her, "Do not weep." Then He came and touched the open coffin, and those who carried him stood still. And He said, "Young man, I say to you, arise." So he who was dead sat up and began to speak. And He presented him to his mother.

Then fear came upon all, and they glorified God, saying, "A great prophet has risen up among us"; and, "God has visited His people."

Pelagia the Penitent

Before her acceptance of Christianity through Baptism, Pelagia was head of a dance troupe in

Palestinian Antioch, living a life of frivolity and prostitution. One day Pelagia, elegantly dressed, was making her way past a church where Saint Nonnus was preaching a sermon. Believers turned their faces away from the sinner, but the bishop glanced after her. Struck by the outer beauty of Pelagia and having foreseen the spiritual greatness within her, the saint prayed in his cell for a long time to the Lord for the sinner. He told his fellow bishops that the prostitute put them all to shame. He explained that she took great care to adorn her body in order to appear beautiful in the eyes of men. "We... take no thought for the adornment of our wretched souls," he said.

On the following day, when Saint Nonnus was teaching in the church about the dread Last Judgment and its consequences, Pelagia came. The teaching made a tremendous impression upon her. With the fear of God and weeping tears of repentance, she asked the saint for Baptism. Seeing her sincere and full repentance, Bishop Nonnus baptized her.

By night the devil appeared to Pelagia, urging her to return to her former life. The saint prayed, signed herself with the Sign of the Cross, and the devil vanished.

Three days after her baptism, Saint Pelagia gathered up her valuables and took them to Bishop Nonnus. The bishop ordered that they be distributed among the poor saying, "Let this be wisely dispersed, so that these riches gained by sin may become a wealth of righteousness." After this Saint Pelagia journeyed to Jerusalem to the Mount of Olives. She lived there in a cell, disguised as the monk Pelagius, living in ascetic seclusion, and attaining great spiritual gifts. When she died, she was buried in her cell (460 AD).
