This Week in Church School

Today's lesson: St. Paul's Letter to the Galatians

Verse (younger classes): Galatians 5:22-23- "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control."

Questions to ask/review:

- How can our behavior leave a "good or bad taste" with someone?
- Explain each of the behaviors from the verse.
- Why do we know these come from God? How do they affect us and others?

Verse (older classes): Galatians 6:7- "Do not be deceived, God is not mocked; for whatever a man sows, that he will also reap."

Questions to ask/review:

- What problem was Paul addressing in his letter to the Galatians?
- How can our lives be compared to sowing seeds? What is good seed?
- What is the reward for sowing good seed? Bad seed?
- Have you ever seen someone doing something wrong and seeming to get away with it?
- What consequences exist that we do not see at first? What will they reap?
- Is there right and wrong? What does God teach us?
- Some people believe in relative morality. What does this mean? Why is this false?

Suggested Activities at home:

Make a fruit dish. Discuss the tastes and which fruits of the Spirit you are reminded of. When your child makes a poor decision, discuss how their actions reap suffering for themselves.

Prayer: Lord grant me fruits of the Spirit. OR Lord, strengthen me to sow good seeds in my heart.

Thou didst <u>em</u>ulate the zeal of the A<u>pos</u>tles and shone forth like a <u>morning</u> star, and thy <u>works</u> showed thy God-given <u>pow</u>er: thou didst <u>guide</u> the <u>er</u>ring to God,// O <u>hierarch</u> A<u>ber</u>cius.

Tone 3 Kontakion (Resurrection)

On this day Thou didst rise from the tomb, O <u>Mer</u>ciful One,

leading us from the <u>gates</u> of death.

On this day Adam exults as Eve rejoices;
with the Prophets and <u>Pa</u>triarchs//
they unceasingly praise the divine <u>ma</u>jesty of
Thy <u>pow</u>er.

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit.

Tone 4 Kontakion (Holy Youths)

The Seven Holy Youths renounced the perishing comf forts of this world,

preferring the eternal things of $\underline{\text{Heav}}$ en. They were incorrupt after death and $\underline{\text{rose}}$ from the dead

and buried the snares of the <u>de</u>vils!//
O faithful, let us then honor them, singing a
hymn of <u>praise</u> to Christ!

Tone 6 Kontakion of the Theotokos

Steadfast protectress of <u>Christ</u>ians, constant <u>ad</u>vocate before the Cre<u>a</u>tor, do not despise the cry of us <u>sin</u>ners, but in your <u>good</u>ness come speedily to help us who call on <u>you</u> in faith.

Hasten to hear our intercessions and to intercede for us, O Theo<u>to</u>kos
For you <u>al</u>ways protect those who <u>hon</u>or you.

Sing praises to our God, sing praises! / Sing praises to our King, sing praises! (*Ps. 46:6*)

Epistle of the Sunday (Galatians 1:11-19)

But I make known to you, brethren, that the gospel which was preached by me is not according to man. For I neither received it from man, nor was I taught it, but it came through the revelation of Jesus Christ.

For you have heard of my former conduct in Judaism, how I persecuted the church of God beyond measure and tried to destroy it. And I advanced in Judaism beyond many of my contemporaries in my own nation, being more exceedingly zealous for the traditions of my fathers.

But when it pleased God, who separated me from my mother's womb and called me through His grace, to reveal His Son in me, that I might preach Him among the Gentiles, I did not

immediately confer with flesh and blood, nor did I go up to Jerusalem to those who were apostles before me; but I went to Arabia, and returned again to Damascus.

Then after three years I went up to Jerusalem to see Peter, and remained with him fifteen days. But I saw none of the other apostles except James, the Lord's brother.

Gospel of the Sunday (Luke 16:19-31)

"There was a certain rich man who was clothed in purple and fine linen and fared sumptuously every day. But there was a certain beggar named Lazarus, full of sores, who was laid at his gate, desiring to be fed with the crumbs which fell from the rich man's table. Moreover the dogs came and licked his sores. So it was that the beggar died, and was carried by the angels to Abraham's bosom. The rich man also died and was buried. And being in torments in Hades, he lifted up his eyes and saw Abraham afar off, and Lazarus in his bosom.

"Then he cried and said, 'Father Abraham, have mercy on me, and send Lazarus that he may dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue; for I am tormented in this flame.' But Abraham said, 'Son, remember that in your lifetime you received your good things, and likewise Lazarus evil things; but now he is comforted and you are tormented. And besides all this, between us and you there is a great gulf fixed, so that those who want to pass from here to you cannot, nor can those from there pass to us.'

"Then he said, 'I beg you therefore, father, that you would send him to my father's house, for I have five brothers, that he may testify to them, lest they also come to this place of torment.' Abraham said to him, 'They have Moses and the prophets; let them hear them.' And he said, 'No, father Abraham; but if one goes to them from the dead, they will repent.' But he said to him, 'If they do not hear Moses and the prophets,

neither will they be persuaded though one rise from the dead.' "

The Seven Sleepers of Ephesus

In the middle of the 3rd century AD, the Roman Emperor Decius tortured and killed, without any discrimination, young and old Christians. At that time, seven youths (Maximilian, Iamblicus, Martinian, John, Dionysius, Exacustodianus and Antoninus) did not want to deny their faith in the Trinity, so after previously giving away their possessions to the poor, they left the city and hid in a cave, until the persecution ceased.

But as the danger was approaching, they prayed to the Holy Spirit, that if God would allow it, He would take their souls so that they would not fall alive into the hands of Emperor Decius. God heard their prayers and recognized their pure intentions. So, after going to bed at night, they did not wake up in the morning.

194 years later, under Emperor Theodosius the Younger, a heterodox sect proclaimed in Ephesus that there would be no resurrection of the dead. At the same time, the youngest of the Seven Youths of Ephesus awoke, left the cave, and bought bread with a coin that he had with him from the time of Emperor Decius. They immediately arrested him. But after interrogating him and telling them who he was, they went back to the cave and found the other six youths alive.

Then, everyone understood that it was a miracle and a true intervention of God, and, therefore, even people who were doubting at first finally believed that the resurrection of the dead and awaiting the second coming of Christ is a true Christian belief.
