This Week in Church School

Today's lesson: St. Paul's Letter to the Colossians

Verse (younger classes): Colossians 3:13-"forgiving one another, if anyone has a complaint against another; even as Christ forgave you, so you also must do."

Questions to ask/review:

- Has anyone ever done anything mean or nasty to you?
- Have you ever done anything mean or nasty to others?
- Think of specific examples. Have you forgiven that person? Have you been forgiven?
- Have you said you are sorry when you do something that hurts someone?
- Why is it important to forgive?
- How many times should we forgive someone?

Verse (older classes): Colossians 3:23- "And whatever you do, do it heartily, as to the Lord and not to men."

Questions to ask/review:

- What makes this letter unique for Paul?
- What are examples of humble and quiet service? In the Scriptures? In your life?
- Have you ever been frustrated because someone was recognized for a good deed but you were not? What does Jesus say about this situation?
- When we do a good deed, who are we serving? Why?

Suggested Activities at home:

- Pray the Lord's Prayer and discuss forgiveness.
- Each day, be sure your child has forgiven anyone he has been hurt by and is forgiven by anyone he has hurt.
- Using the forgiveness bouquets from Church School; the child should give a flower anytime he needs forgiveness this week.
- Look at other Bible stories of forgiveness, such as Joseph and his brothers.
- Do something kind and charitable, expecting nothing in return.

Prayer: Lord, help me to forgive others. OR Lord, make me your humble servant. Amen.

Epistle of the Sunday (Ephesians 2:4-10)

But God, who is rich in mercy, because of His great love with which He loved us, even when we were dead in trespasses, made us alive together with Christ (by grace you have been saved), and raised us up together, and made us sit together in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, that in the ages to come He might show the exceeding riches of His grace in His kindness toward us in Christ Jesus. For by grace you have been saved through faith, and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God, not of works, lest anyone should boast. For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand that we should walk in them. And behold, a certain lawyer stood up and tested Him, saying, "Teacher, what shall I do to inherit eternal life?"

He said to him, "What is written in the law? What is your reading of it?"

So he answered and said, " 'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength, and with all your mind,' and 'your neighbor as yourself.' "

And He said to him, "You have answered rightly; do this and you will live."

But he, wanting to justify himself, said to Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?"

Then Jesus answered and said: "A certain man went down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell among thieves, who stripped him of his clothing, wounded him, and departed, leaving him half dead. Now by chance a certain priest came down that road. And when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. Likewise a Levite, when he arrived at the place, came and looked, and passed by on the other side. But a certain Samaritan, as he journeyed, came where he was. And when he saw him, he had compassion. So he went to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine; and he set him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. On the next day, when he departed, he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said to him, 'Take care of him; and whatever more you spend, when I come again, I will repay you.' So which of these three do you think was neighbor to him who fell among the thieves?"

And he said, "He who showed mercy on him." Then Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise."

Communion Hymn

Praise the Lord from the heavens, praise Him in the highest! (Ps. 148:1) Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia! Saint Anthony the Great said: "On our neighbor depends life and death (of the soul). By winning our brother we win God; by offending our brother we sin against Christ." Saint John Kolovos, one of the greatest Fathers of the Egyptian skete, said: "It is not possible to build a house by beginning from the top, but the structure must be begun from the foundation and built up to the roof. When asked what the foundation meant, he replied: 'The foundation is our neighbor. We must win him and begin with him. On him are based all the Commandments of Christ.' Saint Mark the Ascetic said: 'It is impossible to be saved otherwise than through one's neighbor.'" This is what is held and taught by all the Holy Fathers; this is the general Christian teaching, the teaching of the Church, the teaching of Christ.

Direct all your attention to the acquisition of love for your neighbor as the basis of your life and your monastic task. Love your neighbor according to the dictates of the commandments of the Gospel, not at all according to the dictates and impulses of your heart. The love planted by God in our nature was damaged by the fall and cannot act correctly. On no account allow it to act! Its actions have lost their purity; they are abominable in God's sight, like a polluted sacrifice. The fruits of its actions are souldestroying, deadly. Love your neighbor in the following way: Do not get angry with him and do not bear resentment or a grudge against him. Do not allow yourself to say to your neighbor any reproachful, abusive, sarcastic or caustic words. Maintain peace with him as far as possible. Humble yourself in his presence. Do not try to have your revenge on him directly or indirectly. Whenever possible, yield to him. Get out of the habit of arguing and quarrelling, and reject it as sign of pride and selflove. Speak well of those who speak evil of you. Pay good for evil. Pray for those who cause you various offences, wrongs, temptations, persecutions (St. Matthew 5:21-48). Whatever you do, on no account condemn anyone; do not even try to judge whether a person is good or bad, but keep your eyes on that one evil person for whom you must give an account before God--yourself (St. Matthew 7:11).
