This Week in Church School

Today's lesson: St. Paul's First and Second Letter to Timothy

Verse (younger classes): II Timothy 2:10-

"Therefore I endure all things for the sake of the elect, that they may also obtain the salvation which is in Christ Jesus..."

Questions to ask/review:

- Jesus called Himself the Good Shepherd. What does that mean?
- What dangers do we, His sheep, face? How does He protect us?
- Give examples from the Scriptures of God saving someone from danger.
- How can we "run" to our shepherd when we need help?
- How do our bishop and priest act as shepherds?

Verse (older classes): II Timothy 1:5- "I call to remembrance the genuine faith that is in you which dwelt first in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice, and I am persuaded is in you also."

Questions to ask/review:

- These epistles are called "pastoral". What does that mean?
- Who was Timothy? What was Paul's relationship with him?
- Why is family important? Why should we love our family?
- What is your role in your family? How can you serve God through your family life?
- When your family faces struggles, how can you help?

Suggested Activities at home:

- Sing the song "I just want to be a sheep." (lyrics and music can be found easily on the internet)
- Share your family tree and family history with your child..

Prayer: Jesus, our Good Shepherd, help us follow you to your Kingdom. Amen. OR Lord, bless our family and strengthen our love. Amen.

O holy Bishop <u>Nich</u>olas,

Tone 1 Troparion (Ven. Alypius)

Thou wast a <u>pil</u>lar of patient en<u>dur</u>ance, having imitated the forefathers, O <u>Ven</u>erable One:

Job in suffering and Joseph in temp<u>ta</u>tions. Thou didst <u>live</u> like the Bodiless Ones while yet in the flesh, Alypius, our <u>fat</u>her.// Beseech Christ God that our <u>souls</u> may be saved!

Tone 8 Kontakion (Resurrection)

By rising <u>from</u> the <u>tomb</u>, Thou didst raise the dead and resurrect <u>Ad</u>am. Eve exults <u>in</u> Thy <u>Resurrection</u>,// and the world <u>cel</u>ebrates Thy <u>rising</u> from the dead, O greatly <u>Mer</u>ciful One!

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit.

Tone 8 Kontakion(Ven. Alypius)

The Church glorifies and <u>praises thee</u> today, O A<u>ly</u>pius,

as a perfect ex<u>ample</u> of <u>vir</u>tue and the boast of as<u>cet</u>ics.// Through thy prayers, grant re<u>mis</u>sion of <u>sins</u> to all who venerate thy life and thy <u>strugg</u>les!

Hasten to hear our intercessions and to intercede for us, O Theo<u>to</u>kos
For you <u>al</u>ways protect those who <u>hon</u>or you.

Tone 8 Prokeimenon (Resurrection)

Pray and make your vows / before the Lord, our God! (Ps. 75:10a)

Epistle of the Sunday (Ephesians 4:1-6)

I, therefore, the prisoner of the Lord, beseech you to walk worthy of the calling with which you were called, with all lowliness and gentleness, with longsuffering, bearing with one another in love, endeavoring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called in one hope of your calling; one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all, who is above all, and through all, and in you all.

Gospel of the Sunday (Luke 13: 10-17)

Now He was teaching in one of the synagogues on the Sabbath. And behold, there was a woman who had a spirit of infirmity eighteen years, and was bent over and could in no way raise herself up. But when Jesus saw her, He called her to Him and said to her, "Woman, you are loosed from your infirmity." And He laid His hands on her, and immediately she was made straight, and glorified God. But the ruler of the synagogue answered with indignation, because Jesus had healed on the Sabbath; and he said to the crowd, "There are six days on which men ought to work; therefore come and be healed on them, and not on the Sabbath day."

The Lord then answered him and said, "Hypocrite! Does not each one of you on the Sabbath loose his ox or donkey from the stall, and lead it away to water it? So ought not this woman, being a daughter of Abraham, whom Satan has bound—think of it—for eighteen years, be loosed from this bond on the Sabbath?" And when He said these things, all His adversaries were put to shame; and all the multitude rejoiced for all the glorious things that were done by Him.

Communion Hymn

Praise the Lord from the heavens, praise Him in the highest! (Ps. 148:1) Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia!

On Patience

"When patience greatly increases in our soul, it is a sign that we have secretly received the grace of consolation. The power of patience is stronger than the joyful thoughts that descend into the heart." *St. Isaac the Syrian – "Ascetical Homilies" (Homily Forty-Eight)*

"...It is patience that both commends us to God, and saves us for God. It is that same patience which tempers anger, bridles the tongue, governs the mind, guards peace, rules discipline, breaks the onslaught of lust, suppresses the violence of pride, extinguishes the fire of dissension, restrains the power of the wealthy, renews the endurance of the poor in bearing their lot, guards the blessed integrity of virgins, the difficult chastity of widows, and the indivisible love of husbands and wives. It makes men humble in prosperity, brave in adversity, meek in the face of injuries and insults. It teaches us to pardon our offenders quickly; if you yourself should offend, it teaches you to ask pardon often and with perseverance. It vanquishes temptations, sustains persecutions, endures sufferings and martyrdoms to the end. It is this patience which strongly fortifies the foundations of our faith. It is this patience which sublimely promotes the growth of hope. It directs our action, so that we can keep to the way of Christ while we make progress because of his forbearance. It ensures our perseverance as sons of God while we imitate the patience of the Father." St. Cyprian of Carthage - "The Good of Patience"

"...In proportion to your humility you are given patience in your woes; and in proportion to your patience the burden of your afflictions is made lighter and you will find consolation; in proportion to your consolation, your love of God increases; and in proportion to your love, your joy in the Holy Spirit is magnified. Once men have truly become His sons, our tenderly compassionate Father does not take away their temptations from them when it is His pleasure to 'make for them a way to escape' (1 Cor. 10:13), but instead He gives His sons patience in their trials. All these good things are given into the hand of their patience for the perfecting of their souls." *St. Isaac the Syrian - "Ascetical Homilies" (Homily Forty-Two)*

"Ask with tears, seek with obedience, knock with patience. For thus he who asks receives, and he who seeks finds, and to him that knocketh it shall be opened."
