This Week in Church School

Today's lesson: (St. Paul's) Letter to the Hebrews

Verse (*younger classes*): Hebrews 11:1- "Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen."

Questions to ask/review:

- Give examples of people from the Old Testament who were faithful to God. Did they ever "see" God? How did they persevere?
- What does it mean that we are surrounded by a "cloud full of witnesses"?

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Verse (*older classes*): Hebrews 7:17- "For He testifies: 'You are a priest forever according to the order of Melchizedek.'"

Questions to ask/review:

- Where was the law of Moses received?
- Who were the priests of the law of Moses?
- What was the role of sacrifice in the law of Moses? How were sins taken away?
- Explain how Melchizedek was different than the Levite priests.
- What did Melchizedek do for Abraham?
 What happened to Melchizedek?
- How is Jesus like Melchizedek? How is Jesus also different from the Levites?
- How did Melchizedek prefigure the New Testament?

Suggested Activities at home:

- Discuss examples of things that are unseen but we know exist (ex: the wind).
- Role play the blessing of Abraham by Melchizedek.

Prayer: Lord, may we today have great faith like your servants of old. OR Lord, thank you for taking away our sins forever.

Hymns and Readings for Sunday, January 7

Tone 6 Troparion (Resurrection)

The Angelic Powers were <u>at</u> Thy tomb; the guards became as <u>dead</u> men.

Mary <u>stood</u> by Thy grave, seeking Thy most pure <u>body</u>.

Thou didst capture hell not being <u>tempted</u> by it.

Thou didst come to the Virgin, <u>granting</u> life.

O Lord, Who didst <u>rise</u> from the dead,// <u>glo</u>ry to Thee.

Tone 1 Troparion (Feast)

When <u>Thou</u>, O Lord, wast baptized in the <u>Jor</u>dan, the worship of the Trinity was made <u>manifest</u>. For the <u>voice</u> of the Father bore <u>witness</u> to Thee, and called Thee His be<u>lov</u>ed Son; and the <u>Spirit</u> in the form of a <u>dove</u> confirmed the <u>truth</u>fulness of His word.

O <u>Christ</u> our God, Who hast re<u>vealed</u> Thyself// and hast enlightened the world, <u>glo</u>ry to Thee.

Tone 2 Troparion (Forerunner)

The <u>mem</u>ory of the righteous is celebrated with <u>hymns</u> of praise,

but the Lord's testimony is sufficient for thee, O <u>Fore</u>runner.

Thou wast <u>shown</u> in truth to be the most honorable of the <u>Proph</u>ets,

for thou wast deemed worthy to baptize in the streams of the Jordan <u>Him</u> Whom they foretold.

<u>There</u>fore, having suffered for the <u>truth</u> with joy,

thou didst proclaim to those in hell God Who appeared in the flesh,

Who <u>takes</u> away the <u>sin</u> of the world,// and grants us <u>great mer</u>cy.

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit.

Tone 6 Kontakion (Forerunner)

The river Jordan trembled, and was $\underline{\text{driv}}$ en back, filled with fear at Thy $\underline{\text{com}}$ ing in the flesh,

while John drew <u>back</u> in awe as he fulfilled the ministry of the <u>Spir</u>it. The ranks of Angels <u>stood</u> amazed when they beheld Thee <u>bap</u>tized in the stream. And we who were in darkness are <u>filled</u> with light.//

We praise Thee, O God made manifest, as Thou dost enlighten all.

Now and ever and unto ages of ages. Amen.

Tone 4 Kontakion (Feast)

Today Thou hast shone forth to the world, O Lord,

and the light of Thy countenance has been marked on us.

Knowing Thee, we sing Thy <u>praises</u>: "Thou hast come and re<u>vealed</u> Thyself,// O unap<u>proach</u>able Light."

Tone 1 Prokeimenon (Sunday After)

Let Thy mercy, O Lord, be upon us / as we have set our hope on Thee! (*Ps.* 32:22)

Tone 7 Prokeimenon (Forerunner)

The righteous shall rejoice in the Lord / and shall hope in Him. (Ps. 63:11a)

Epistle of the Sunday (Ephesians 4:7-13)

ut to each one of us grace was given according to the measure of Christ's gift. Therefore He says:

"When He ascended on high, He led captivity captive, And gave gifts to men."

(Now this, "He ascended"—what does it mean but that He also first descended into the lower parts of the earth? He who descended is also the One who ascended far above all the heavens, that He might fill all things.) And He Himself gave some to be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, and some pastors and teachers, for the equipping of the saints for the work of ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ, till we all come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to a perfect man, to the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ;

Gospel of the Sunday (Matthew 4:12-17)

Now when Jesus heard that John had been put in prison, He departed to Galilee. And leaving Nazareth, He came and dwelt in Capernaum, which is by the sea, in the regions of Zebulun and Naphtali, that it might be fulfilled which was spoken by Isaiah the prophet, saying:

"The land of Zebulun and the land of Naphtali, By the way of the sea, beyond the Jordan, Galilee of the Gentiles:

The people who sat in darkness have seen a great light,

And upon those who sat in the region and shadow of death
Light has dawned."

From that time Jesus began to preach and to say, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand."

Hymn to the Theotokos (Feast)

Magnify, O my soul, the most pure Virgin Theotokos,

more honorable than the heavenly hosts!

No tongue knows how to praise thee worthily, O Theotokos;

even angels are overcome with awe praising thee.

But since thou art good, accept our faith; for thou knowest our love inspired by God! Thou art the defender of Christians, and we magnify thee.

Communion Hymn

Praise the Lord from the heavens, praise Him in the highest! (Ps. 148:1) The righteous shall be in everlasting remembrance! He shall not fear evil tidings! (Ps. 111:6) Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia!

The Spirit of God Descending Like a Dove

But why in the fashion of a dove? Gentle is that creature, and pure. For as much then as the Spirit too is a Spirit of meekness, He therefore appears in this sort. And besides, He is reminding us of an ancient history. For so, when once a common shipwreck had overtaken the whole world, and our race was in danger of perishing, this creature appeared, and indicated the deliverance from the tempest, and bearing an olive branch, Genesis 8 published the good tidings of the common calm of the whole world; all which was a type of the things to come. For in fact the condition of men was then much worse, and they deserved a much sorer punishment. To prevent your despairing, therefore, He reminds you of that history. Because then also, when things were desperate, there was a sort of deliverance and reformation; but then by punishment, now, on the contrary, by grace and an unspeakable gift. (2 Corinthians 9:15) Therefore the dove also appears, not bearing an olive branch, but pointing out to us our Deliverer from all evils, and suggesting the gracious hopes. For not from out of an ark does she lead one man only, but the whole world she leads up into heaven at her appearing, and instead of a branch of peace from an olive, she conveys the adoption to all the world's offspring in common.

Reflect now on the greatness of the gift, and do not account His dignity the less for His appearing in such a likeness. For I actually hear some saying, that such as is the difference between a man and a dove, so great is that between Christ and the Spirit: since the one appeared in our nature, the other in the likeness of a dove. What must we say then to these things? That the Son of God did indeed take upon Him the nature of man, but the Spirit took not on Him the nature of a dove. Therefore the evangelist also said not, in the nature of a dove, but in the form of a dove. Accordingly, never after did He so much as appear in this fashion, but at that moment only.. For the truth of an economy is one thing, and the condescension of a temporary vision another. (*Chrysostom*)
