This Week in Church School

Today's lesson: Epistle of St James

Verse (*younger classes*): James 3:5- "Even so the tongue is a little member and boasts great things. See how great a forest a little fire kindles."

Questions to ask/review:

- What did God give us the tongue for?
- Describe a time when you were hurt by someone's words.
- Describe a time when your words hurt another.
- How can our tongue hurt others?
- How can words burn others like a fire?

Verse (*older classes*): James 4:1-2- "Where do wars and fights come from among you? Do they not come from your desires for pleasure that war in your members?"

Questions to ask/review:

- Who was James? What was his relationship to Jesus?
- Describe examples in your life and the Scriptures when someone was consumed with anger.
- What did the anger push them to do? What damage was done? Was it worth it? Why not?
- Why do we get angry? What is behind the anger?
- Why is most anger sinful? How does it harm us? How does it harm the Church?

Suggested Activities at home:

- Make a "tongue jar", decorate it, and put a penny in each time a family member says something that hurts someone else.
- Explore the tongue with sweet, sour, salty, and bitter things with a blindfold on.
- Seek forgiveness for recent times when you have hurt someone in your words or anger.

Prayer: Lord, forgive me for the acts of my mighty tongue and help me to control it better tomorrow. OR Lord, forgive me for my anger and bring me peace. Amen.

Hymns and Readings for Sunday, January 14

Tone 7 Troparion (Resurrection)

By Thy <u>Cross</u> Thou didst destroy <u>death</u>.

To the thief Thou didst open <u>Par</u>adise.

For the <u>Myrrh</u>bearers Thou didst change weeping into <u>joy</u>,

and Thou didst command Thy disciples. O Ch

and Thou didst command Thy disciples, O <u>Christ</u> God,

to pro<u>claim</u> that Thou art <u>ris</u>en,//granting the <u>world</u> great <u>mercy</u>.

Tone 1 Troparion (Feast)

When <u>Thou</u>, O Lord, wast baptized in the <u>Jor</u>dan, the worship of the Trinity was made <u>manifest</u>. For the <u>voice</u> of the Father bore <u>witness</u> to Thee, and called Thee His be<u>loved Son</u>; and the <u>Spirit</u> in the form of a <u>dove</u> confirmed the <u>truthfulness</u> of His word. O <u>Christ</u> our God, Who hast re<u>vealed</u> Thyself// and hast enlightened the world, <u>glo</u>ry to Thee.

Tone 4 Troparion (St Nicholas)

You appeared to your flock as a <u>rule</u> of faith, an image of humility, and a teacher of <u>ab</u>stinence.

Because of your lowliness heaven was <u>op</u>ened to you!

Because of your poverty riches were granted to you!

O holy Bishop <u>Nich</u>olas, pray to Christ our God to <u>save</u> our souls.

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit.

Tone 7 Kontakion (Resurrection)

The do<u>min</u>ion of death can no longer hold men captive,

for Christ descended, shattering and destroying its <u>pow</u>ers.

Hell is <u>bound</u>, while the Prophets rejoice and cry:

"The Savior has come to those in faith;// enter, you faithful, into the Resurrection!"

Now and ever and unto ages of ages. Amen.

Tone 4 Kontakion (Feast)

Today Thou hast shone forth to the world, O Lord,

and the light of Thy countenance has been marked on us.

Knowing Thee, we sing Thy <u>praises</u>: "Thou hast come and re<u>vealed</u> Thyself,// O unap<u>proach</u>able Light."

Tone 7 Prokeimenon (Resurrection)

The Lord shall give strength to His people. / The Lord shall bless His people with peace. (*Ps.* 28:11)

Tone 4 Prokeimenon (Feast)

Blessed is He that comes in the Name of the Lord. / God is the Lord and has revealed Himself to us. (*Ps.* 117:26b, 27b)

Epistle of the Sunday (Ephesians 6:10-17)

Finally, my brethren, be strong in the Lord and in the power of His might. Put on the whole armor of God, that you may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil. For we do not wrestle against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this age, against spiritual hosts of wickedness in the heavenly places. Therefore take up the whole armor of God, that you may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand.

Stand therefore, having girded your waist with truth, having put on the breastplate of righteousness, and having shod your feet with the preparation of the gospel of peace; above all, taking the shield of faith with which you will be able to quench all the fiery darts of the wicked one. And take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God;

Gospel of the Sunday (Luke 18:35-43)

Then it happened, as He was coming near Jericho, that a certain blind man sat by the road begging. And hearing a multitude passing by, he asked what it meant. So they told him that Jesus of Nazareth was passing by. And he cried out, saying, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!"

Then those who went before warned him that he should be quiet; but he cried out all the more, "Son of David, have mercy on me!"

So Jesus stood still and commanded him to be brought to Him. And when he had come near, He asked him, saying, "What do you want Me to do for you?"

He said, "Lord, that I may receive my sight."

Then Jesus said to him, "Receive your sight; your faith has made you well." And immediately he received his sight, and followed Him, glorifying God. And all the people, when they saw it, gave praise to God.

Hymn to the Theotokos (Feast)

Magnify, O my soul, the most pure Virgin Theotokos,

more honorable than the heavenly hosts!

No tongue knows how to praise thee worthily, O Theotokos;

even angels are overcome with awe praising thee.

But since thou art good, accept our faith; for thou knowest our love inspired by God! Thou art the defender of Christians, and we magnify thee.

Communion Hymn

Praise the Lord from the heavens, praise Him in the highest! (Ps. 148:1) The grace of God has appeared for the salvation of all men. (Titus 2:11) Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia!
