This Week in Church School

Today's lesson: First Letter of St Peter

Verse (*younger classes*): 1 Peter 2- "you also, as living stones, are being built up a spiritual house...the stone which the builders rejected has become the chief cornerstone."

Questions to ask/review:

- How is God like a rock?
- What is a cornerstone?
- Why does Peter call Christ "the chief cornerstone"?

Verse (*older classes*): 1 Peter 1:25- "But the word of the Lord endures forever."

Questions to ask/review:

- Who was Peter? What was his role in the early Church?
- What is Scripture? Where did the books of the Bible come from?
- How does the Word of the Lord "endure forever" in the Church? Give multiple examples.
- What misunderstanding do some Christians have about the role of Scripture?
- What does Orthodoxy teach about Scripture and Tradition?

Suggested Activities at home:

- Using blocks or other materials, construct a building. Find a cornerstone and decorate it.
 Try to build on different surfaces. Discuss the meaning of building our lives on firm foundations.
- Play Jenga!
- Explore the different letters of the Scriptures that we have studied. Make a collage of your favorite verses..

Prayer: Lord, help me to build my life on You as my rock OR Lord, may Your Word endure with me throughout my life. Amen.

Tone 4 Troparion (St Nicholas)

You appeared to your flock as a <u>rule</u> of faith, an image of humility, and a teacher of <u>ab</u>stinence.

Because of your lowliness heaven was <u>op</u>ened to you!

Because of your poverty riches were granted to you!

O holy Bishop <u>Nich</u>olas, pray to Christ our God to save our souls.

By rising <u>from</u> the <u>tomb</u>, Thou didst raise the dead and resurrect <u>Ad</u>am.

Eve exults <u>in</u> Thy <u>Resurrection</u>,// and the world <u>cel</u>ebrates Thy <u>ris</u>ing from the dead, O greatly <u>Mer</u>ciful One!

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit.

Tone 3 Kontakion (St Nicholas)

O Saint you re<u>vealed</u> yourself in Myra <u>as</u> a priest,

for you fulfilled the <u>Gospel</u> of Christ by giving up your <u>soul</u> for your <u>people</u>, and saving the innocent from death.// Therefore you are blessed as one well <u>learn</u>ed in the <u>grace</u> of God.

Epistle of the Sunday (Colossians 1:12-18)

...giving thanks to the Father who has qualified us to be partakers of the inheritance of the saints in the light. He has delivered us from the power of darkness and conveyed us into the kingdom of the Son of His love, in whom we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of sins.

He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn over all creation. For by Him all things were created that are in heaven and that are on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or principalities or powers. All things were created through Him and for Him. And He is before all things, and in Him all things consist. And He is the head of the body, the church, who is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, that in all things He may have the preeminence.

Gospel of the Sunday (Matthew 22:1-14)

And Jesus answered and spoke to them again by parables and said: "The kingdom of heaven is like a certain king who arranged a marriage for his son, and sent out his servants to call those who were invited to the wedding; and they were not willing to come. Again, he sent out other servants, saying, 'Tell those who are invited. "See, I have prepared my dinner; my oxen and fatted cattle are killed, and all things are ready. Come to the wedding." 'But they made light of it and went their ways, one to his own farm, another to his business. And the rest seized his servants, treated them spitefully, and killed them. But when the king heard about it, he was furious. And he sent out his armies, destroyed those murderers, and burned up their city. Then he said to his servants, 'The wedding is ready, but those who were invited were not worthy. Therefore go into the highways, and as many as you find, invite to the wedding.' So those servants went out into the highways and gathered together all whom they found, both bad and good. And the wedding hall was filled with guests.

"But when the king came in to see the guests, he saw a man there who did not have on a wedding garment. So he said to him, 'Friend, how did you come in here without a wedding garment?' And he was speechless. Then the king said to the servants, 'Bind him hand and foot, take him away, and cast him into outer darkness; there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth.'

"For many are called, but few are chosen."

St Maximus the Confessor on God

1. First the intellect marvels when it reflects on the absolute infinity of God, that boundless sea for which it longs so much. Then it is amazed at how God has brought things into existence out of nothing. But just as 'His magnificence is without limit' (Ps. 145:3. LXX), so 'there is no penetrating His purposes' (Isa. 40:28).

- 2. How can the intellect not marvel when it contemplates that immense and more than astonishing sea of goodness? Or how is it not astounded when it reflects on how and from what source there have come into being both nature endowed with intelligence and intellect, and the four elements which compose physical bodies, although no matter existed before their generation? What kind of potentiality was it which, once actualized, brought these things into being? But all this is not accepted by those who follow the pagan Greek philosophers, ignorant as they are of that all-powerful goodness and its effective wisdom and knowledge, transcending the human intellect.
- 3. God is the Creator from all eternity, and He creates when He wills, in His infinite goodness, through His coessential Logos and Spirit. Do not raise the objection: 'Why did He create at a particular moment since He is good from all eternity?' For I reply that the unsearchable wisdom of the infinite essence does not come within the compass of human knowledge.
- 4. When the Creator willed. He gave being to and manifested that knowledge of created things which already existed in Him from all eternity. For in the case of almighty God it is ridiculous to doubt that He can give being to anything when He so wills..
- 5. Try to learn why God created; for that is true knowledge. But do not try to learn how He created or why He did so comparatively recently; for that does not come within the compass of your intellect Of divine realities some may be apprehended by men and others may not. Unbridled speculation, as one of the saints has said, can drive one headlong over the precipice.
