A New Life

yy St Gregory of Nyssa (4th c)

All who are made glad by the gift of regeneration should show the change in their ways that follow it. Our body remains unchanged, but there is certainly need of some clear proof, by which we may recognize the new-born man. These are found in the intentional motions of the soul, whereby it separates itself from its old customary life, and enters on a newer way of conversation; it has become something different from its former self, bearing in it no token by which the old self was recognized. This is the mode of the transformation. A man before Baptism may have been lustful, covetous, grasping at the goods of others, a reviler, a liar, a slanderer, etc. After Baptism let him become orderly, sober, content with his own possessions, giving to those in poverty, truthful, courteous, and affable—in a word, following every laudable course of conduct. As darkness is dispelled by light, and black disappears as whiteness is spread over it, so the old man also disappears when adorned with the works of righteousness. You saw how Zacchaeus, by the change of his life, slew the publican, making fourfold-restitution to those whom he had unjustly damaged, and the rest he divided with the poor. The treasure, which he had gotten by evil means from the poor, whom he oppressed, he restored. The Evangelist Matthew, another publican, of the



same business with Zacchaeus, immediately after his call changed his life as if it had been a mask. Paul was a persecutor, but after the grace bestowed on him, was an Apostle. He bore the weight of his fetters for Christ's sake, as an act of amends and repentance for those unjust bonds which he once received from the Law.

to all.


Gospel of the Sunday (Luke 19:1-10)

Then Jesus entered and passed through Jericho.
Now behold, there was a man named Zacchaeus
who was a chief tax collector, and he was rich. And
he sought to see who Jesus was, but could not
because of the crowd, for he was of short stature.
So he ran ahead and climbed up into a sycamore
tree to see Him, for He was going to pass that way.
And when Jesus came to the place, He looked up
and saw him, and said to him, "Zacchaeus, make
haste and come down, for today I must stay at your
house." So he made haste and came down, and
received Him joyfully. But when they saw it, they all
complained, saying, "He has gone to be a guest
with a man who is a sinner."

Then Zacchaeus stood and said to the Lord, "Look,
Lord, I give half of my goods to the poor; and if I
have taken anything from anyone by false
accusation, I restore fourfold." And Jesus said to
him, "Today salvation has come to this house,
because he also is a son of Abraham; for the Son
of Man has come to seek and to save that which
was lost."




Great Good Works

by *St John Chrysostom*

Do you see that our practice has more power to do
good? By practice I mean, not your fasting, nor yet
your strewing sackcloth and ashes under you, but if
you despise wealth, as it ought to be despised; if
you be kindly affectioned, if you give your bread to
the hungry, if you control anger, if you cast out
vainglory, if you put away envy.

So He Himself used to
teach: for, 'Learn of
me,' says He, 'for I am
meek and lowly in
heart.' [Matthew 11:29]
He did not say, 'for I
fasted,' although surely
He might have spoken
of the forty days, yet He
says not this; but, 'I am
meek and lowly in
heart.' And again, when
sending them out, He
said not, 'Fast,' but,
'Eat of all that is set before you.' With regard to
wealth, however, He required of them great
strictness, saying, 'Provide not gold, or silver, or
brass, in your purses.' [Matthew 10:9]



And all this I say, not to depreciate fasting, God
forbid, but rather highly to commend it. But I grieve
when other duties being neglected, you think it
enough for salvation, having but the last place in
the choir of virtue. For the greatest thing is charity,
and moderation, and almsgiving; which hits a
higher mark even than virginity.

"And this is what you must do ...on that day on which you fast. Then you must estimate the cost of the food you would have eaten on that day on which you intend to fast, and give it to a widow or an orphan or someone in need. In this way you will become humble-minded, so that as a result of your humble-mindedness the one who receives may satisfy his own soul and pray to the Lord on your behalf. If, then, you complete the fast in this way as I have commanded you, your sacrifice will be acceptable in God's sight, and this fast will be recorded, and the service performed in this way is beautiful and joyous and acceptable to the Lord. This is how you must observe these things with your children and your whole household, and in observing them, you will be blessed; indeed, all those who hear and observe them will be blessed, and whatever they ask from the Lord they will receive." **The Shepherd**, c 140 AD

Today in Church School

Today's lesson: Zacchaeus

Questions to ask/review:

- What did Zacchaeus do for a living? Do we know another tax collector in the Bible? (Matthew, the disciple)
- Why couldn't Zacchaeus see Jesus? What did he do? (he was short, he climbed a tree to see)
- What are some things that money can't buy us in life?
- What did Jesus say to Zacchaeus? (come down, today I must stay in your house)
- How did Zacchaeus react? (promised to give away his money and repay those he has wronged)
- How did Jesus's visit with Zacchaeus probably change him?

Suggested activities at home:

- Read the scripture together before bed: Luke 19:1-10.
- Go for a walk and look at trees. Discuss the shapes of trees, their leaves or lack thereof, how they change with the seasons.
- Invite one of your child's friends over for dinner. Ask your child to help prepare the food and plan the menu.
- Prayer: Lord Jesus, Thank you for caring for us and loving us each day. Amen.
